Keep It A Secret

Keep it a Secret

Thursday, April 20 at 8:30 pm

Ireland is probably not the first place that comes to mind when talking about surfing destinations, but with a coastline that is longer than the state of California and some impressive breaks, it was only a matter of time before the secret got out.

Keep It A Secret tells the story of the beginning of surfing on the Emerald Isle. It follows the origins of Northern Ireland's Belfast crew led by Davy Govan and Bo Vance and the Republic of Ireland's Dublin Crew led by Kevin Cavey.

Bo Vance helped to revolutionize surfing in Europe by creating cutting-edge wetsuits, fabricating surfboards, and developing advanced wave prediction tools. Cavey, from Dublin, started C&S Surfboards, Ireland's first surfboard import business giving locals access to proper boards. Cavey was also the first Irishman to compete internationally in surfing tournaments.

While Ireland was still almost completely unknown to the rest of Europe as a surfing destination, Cavey campaigned for his home country to host the 1972 European Surfing Championship.

In 1972, Ireland was in the height of The Troubles, the nearly 30-year violent conflict seeded by historic religious and political differences. Every sporting event in Ireland was cancelled that year with the exception of the newly awarded Eurosurf Championship. Surfers from all over the world traveled to the coastal village of Lahinch defying their governments' pressures to boycott the event.

Keep It A Secret tells the story of how surfers from both sides of the divided island found solace from civil strife in their homeland's waves. With amazing archival footage from the dawn of surfing on the Emerald Isle, first-time feature length filmmaker Sean Duggan takes you on a journey through pristine beaches with picturesque breaks where Ireland's surfing pioneers found a haven from violent conflict and made a lasting impression on the European surfing community.

How Do We Keep Habitual Offenders Off Our Roads?

Thursday, April 27 at 7:30 pm

Public outrage was swift and vocal amid local news reports that the suspect in a fatal Honolulu hit-and-run case was driving without a license, again.

The victim, 16-year-old McKinley High School student Sara Yara, was crossing Kapiolani Boulevard in a marked crosswalk on February 15 with a friend when a motorist hit both of them, according to Honolulu Police. Yara died at the hospital.

Honolulu police arrested the suspect and then released him pending charges, which is not uncommon, but the release also did not sit well with the public, especially with the disclosure that the suspect has 164 citations dating back to 1996 including multiple citations for driving without a license, speeding, running red lights and running stop signs.

In a much-less publicized hit-and-run case from Hawai'i Island the same week, Hawai'i County police arrested a man whom they said fled the scene of a pedestrian accident. He was arrested on suspicion of several charges including failure to render aid and operating a vehicle under the influence of an intoxicant.

Court records show that the suspected driver in the Kona case is also a multiple repeat traffic offender and that his driver license was suspended for four years in 2022 for driving while intoxicated.

The victim in the Kona case, a 73-year-old man, was in a marked crosswalk when he was hit and taken to the hospital in critical condition, according to Hawai'i County police.

This scenario of habitual offenders wreaking havoc on Hawai'i

roadways is not new and these two cases show that the problem is statewide. Many victims and their families have suffered tremendous losses caused by drivers who continually break the law.

So we are asking why? Why does this keep happening? Is Hawai'i too lenient on people who blatantly break the rules of the road while defying court orders? What, if anything, is being done to change that?

In the next **KĀKOU: Hawai'i's Town Hall**, we will bring together decision makers, including law enforcement representatives and other stakeholders, in a live 90-minute program, **How Do We Keep Habitual Offenders Off Our Roads?**

The program premieres at 7:30 pm on Thursday April 27. We want to hear from you as well.

Home is Here

Wednesday, April 26 at 7:30 pm

Three words at the heart of the stories featured in this month's episode of **Home is Here**, are protection, preservation and empowerment.

On the Valley Isle, the work is non-stop for the team at the Maui Ocean Center Marine Institute. Each year the team responds to hundreds of calls for sick, injured and distressed sea turtles. Daily work encompasses everything from rescues to providing high-quality medical care with the goal to release the turtles back into the ocean. The MOC Marine Institute team is small, but filled with passion to protect our honu.

At the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa, the Joseph F. Rock Herbarium was established in 1908. It's home to a collection of more than 50,000 plant specimens, including many rare and endemic plants from Hawai'i and across the Pacific. The herbarium serves as a historical record for species that are threatened or endangered, some even extinct. We'll show you how staffers and students are preserving the massive collection by going digital.

Did you know that one in six adults in Hawai'i struggle with reading and writing? For more than 50 years, Hawaii Literacy has been helping adults and children overcome those challenges by providing free programs and resources. The nonprofit believes that literacy equals equity, and that by empowering people to learn, it will not only open the door to more possibilities, but also strengthen our entire community.
