


## **CEO MESSAGE**



On the evening of April 15, 1999, PBS Hawai'i, then known as Hawai'i Public Television, launched a new musical program highlighting the history, beauty and magic of traditional Hawaiian music.

The historic premiere featured four iconic names in Hawaiian music, Dennis and David Kamakahi, Martin Pahinui and George Kuo. Since then, PBS Hawai'i has broadcast 80 episodes of **Nā Mele**, starring giants in the music industry:

Nathan Aweau Keola Beamer Robert Cazimero Raiatea Helm Led Kaapana Paula Fuga Melveen Leed The Lim Family Genoa Keawe Mākaha Sons Cyril Pahinui Kalani Pe'a Keali'i Reichel Josh Tatofi Jerry Santos ...and dozens more.

In 2024, PBS Hawai'i will celebrate **Nā Mele's** 25th Anniversary with a yearlong pā'ina, featuring special programs, artist profiles, behind-the-scenes footage and virtual events on our broadcast and digital channels.

From a young Jake Shimabukuro who appeared in September 2000 with an electrifying rendition of "The Star-Spangled Banner," to an upcoming

**Nā Mele** pledge program featuring Nā Leo at Halekulani's House Without A Key, this milestone represents a quarter-century of artistic excellence and our dedication and commitment to spotlight the authenticity and diversity of the music of Hawai'i.

The journey continues on January 29, 2024, when we present Hawaiian music singer Kamakakēhau Fernandez. Fernandez was born in Little Rock, Arkansas and adopted by a Maui family when he was an infant. He grew up immersed in the Hawaiian culture and is fluent in 'ōlelo Hawai'i.

"I consider singing to be a little bit later in my career," says Fernandez. He has a passion for R&B music and is a huge Beyoncé fan. His Hawaiian music influences include Aunty Genoa Keawe, Aunty Hulu Lindsey and Uncle Richard Hoʻopiʻi. This year marks 20-years since Fernandez won Hoʻopiʻi's annual falsetto contest and he says, "The rest became history after that."

In this episode of **Nā Mele,** Fernandez hits all the high notes, with both original and cover songs, all while playing the 'ukulele. As an African American raised in a Hawaiian household, he's very much aware of his responsibility to both of his ancestral roots and hopes people who hear his music can feel the aloha he is trying to convey. "For me, the drive really is to look beyond the exterior, you know, and to connect and understand culture and possibilities in hope."

We're excited about our yearlong pā'ina and hope you are too. We remain steadfast in our commitment to build on the legacy of this quintessential program by celebrating the past 25 years and setting the stage for 25 more.

Nearly five billion people on the planet use social media, according to several data collecting sites. That translates to about 64 percent of the world's population, limited in some areas only by a lack of access to the Internet and devices that enable connection.

Led by giants like Facebook, YouTube, Instagram and TikTok, social media is part of modern everyday life. One study says the average user bounces between seven different platforms per month and spends 150 minutes per day on social media or 15 percent of their waking lives.

Common words or phrases in the social media landscape include "going viral," likes," "shares" and "trending." What is really trending is the number of global users, up nearly 80 percent in five years.

Social media is either one of the best communications inventions ever, the worst or something in between, depending on many factors and who you talk to.

For younger people like Generations Z and Alpha, social media is their primary or only source for news, information and entertainment. Families and friends instantly share memories. Critical, life-saving information can also be shared instantly.

Advertising revenue for social media platforms has grown exponentially. Commercial and retail operations are reaching more and more customers via social media every year.

But there is more to the story.

Social media is rife with scammers and other bad players who peddle misinformation. This misinformation can go viral as quickly as a cute TikTok dance or an Instagram video of a gnarly big-wave ride on O'ahu's North Shore.

Misinformation can create false impressions, stir doubt and spread conspiracy theories. Multiple surveys show that frequent users of social media tend to have problems with anxiety, depression and sleep.

At least 40 states are suing Meta, the parent company of Facebook and Instagram, claiming the platforms are addictive and hurt the mental health of children.

# Home is Here WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 31 AT 7:30 PM

This month's episode of **Home is Here** features two stories that are grand in very different ways.

We begin at the edge of Chinatown in Downtown Honolulu at the historic Hawaii Theatre. Construction began in 1915 but completion was delayed because of the Spanish Flu pandemic. The theater opened to the public in 1922 with a scheduled showing of the black and white silent film *The Three Musketeers*. The theater was marketed as the Pride of the Pacific.

In the 1980s, as the building was falling into disrepair, owner Consolidated Amusement decided not to renew its lease. Kamehameha Schools, which owns the land, planned to demolish Hawaii Theatre and build a parking lot. But a group of community activists and volunteers were able to raise enough money to save the theater, which is now owned by the nonprofit Hawaii Theatre Center. "As we're using the space and having more shows for people to come and enjoy, it's incumbent upon us to then maintain the space well, raise the money to help replace the items that are worn out and keep the theater going for future generations," says Hawaii Theatre President and CEO Gregory Dunn.

Our second story is not for the faint of heart. Tens of thousands of Hawai'i residents have participated in the 26.2-mile Honolulu Marathon. But how many people can say they've completed the HURT100, the Hawaiian Ultra Running Team's Trail 100-mile endurance run? Each year, participants trek through 100-miles of trails in the forest above Honolulu.

Runners have to complete various tasks to ensure that they have enough experience to attempt the grueling race. "The hardest part about this course is the relentlessness of the course. Like there's no easy spots. I mean, there's 100-yards of pavement, probably. And other than that, everything's gonna have a root, rocks, you're getting your feet beat up, you're getting your body beat up," says this year's first place finisher Nate Jaqua. But he adds, "It's just fun to challenge yourself and fun to kind of see what you're capable of."
