Nā Mele 25, PBS Hawai'i's yearlong celebration showcasing the rich history and diversity of Hawaiian music, is receiving approval, appreciation and commendation from across the globe, and the best thing about this pa'ina: it's just getting started.

The silver jubilee continues in March with several giants, including Genoa Keawe & Family, which premiered in 2001, featuring Auntie Genoa singing the famous long note from “‘Ālika” with her granddaughter Pōmaika'i (Keawe) Lyman.

Also in March, an appearance by slack key artist George Kahumoku Jr., who learned to play guitar while growing up on Hawai'i Island. “My great grandfather played, my great grandmother, my grandparents played, my dad, uncles, everybody played, even my mom.”

Another Hawai'i Island entertainer, Ledward Kaapana, started his journey in Kalapana. “The music I learned there is from my ‘ohana, my family and one thing about that, I had all the different uncles play different style so I put it all together. I put it into music, and here I am,” he said.

Maui takes center stage when the all-wāhine group Ahumanu, featuring Liz Morales, Kekai Robinson and Marja Apisaloma, shares its Valley Isle style. “Music can be your best friend,” says Morales. “And when everything else falls away and no

one else wants to hang out with you, it's okay, if you got your ‘ukulele you got a best friend for life.”

Speaking of friends, in 1984, four seniors from Kamehameha Schools won the “Brown Bags to Stardom” music contest with their hit, “Local Boys.” I'm not sure if “blue eyes and blonde hair (still) don't thrill them,” but I do know, 40 years later, Nā Leo Pilimehana, which means “voices blending together in warmth,” is still packing houses everywhere.

On March 12, PBS Hawai'i is going high-tech with a livestream performance by Nā Leo Pilimehana from Halekulani's House Without A Key. The Waikiki event is private but everyone can enjoy the live pledge show on PBS Hawai'i's YouTube page starting at 6:30 pm.

Home is Here

The Hawai'i Walls festival started in 2011 under the name Pow!Wow! Hawai'i. Jasper Wong came back home to Hawai'i from Hong Kong and wanted to create an event where artists from diverse backgrounds and communities could come together and create art in the public sphere.

For nearly 10 years, artists from all over the globe came to the Honolulu neighborhood of Kaka'ako to resurface the buildings and public spaces in the once-ignored district. Wong observed the changes to Kaka'ako as year after year renowned artists donated large scale murals to the community.

In 2023, Wong changed the name of the festival to Hawai'i Walls and with the name change came a change in location and focus. In the spring, artists came to the Kalihi-Pālāma district to revitalize an often-underserved area.

"The mindset going into Kalihi [is] let's focus the murals on community-

centered places," says Wong. Places like Pālāma Settlement, Farrington High School, Bishop Museum, and Kalihi Kai and Kalihi Uka Elementary schools.

One of the artists, Chad Williams, who helped paint at Pālāma Settlement, shared what the opportunity to come back to his childhood neighborhood meant to him. "Pālāma means a lot to me. I played Pop Warner football here. And to come back here and give back in any way is huge for me because it played such a huge role in my life."



Each spring the festival lasts for about a week. In addition to renowned artists painting in open spaces and interacting with community members, there are events and workshops that are open to the public.

Artist Max Sansing shared his feelings about being able to connect with the community through his art, "Once I do this, man, I don't own this anymore, like this, this will be here you know. This belongs to the people in the neighborhood in the community."

Hawai'i Walls, Wong explains, "has always been a passion project. And we've never been paid to do it. And the artists have all done it pro bono and volunteered. It's really a festival, a project, an organization that's run purely by volunteers and purely by love, and purely in the belief that art and public art can have an impact, have a positive impact on communities and people."

This is Kohala

THURSDAY, MARCH 28

The Kohala district on the northernmost area of Hawai'i Island is rich in history, most famously known as the birthplace of King Kamehameha I.

About a century after the king's birth, the Kohala Sugar Company opened, with several more plantations to follow. As immigrants arrived for work, families developed a tight-knit community. Though the plantations

are long gone, the memories are still there, but for how long?

The Kohala Oral History Project began in 2019 when Lucas Manuel-Scheibe recorded the stories of his 80-year-old grandmother, Martina Manuel, a long-time resident of Kohala. With the help of his mother, Jocelyn Manuel, Lucas set out to film more of the "old timers."

The interviews were assembled for the film *This is Kohala*. In it, you'll hear the stories about growing up in the plantation camps and the simple life that was enjoyed. "Everybody knew everybody and we never locked our doors," says resident Gloria Teo. Another resident, Connie Chun, recalls how only one house had a television. But because they were able to get along without a lot of things, she says, "that's how come we became strong."

As with everything, the Kohala district evolved over the years. The filmmakers hope the movie and the project will serve as a living history of Kohala through the lens of the people who grew up and still live there.
