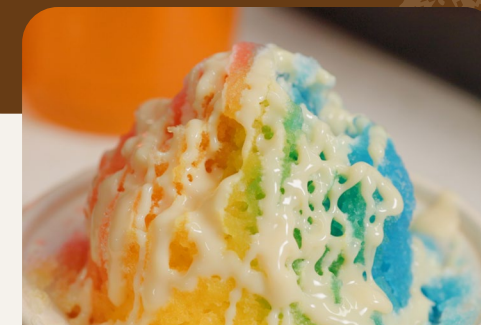


As an interpretive ranger at Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park, Keoni Kaholo'a'a helps visitors form their own connection to the area by educating them about the natural and spiritual elements within the attraction. It's an opportunity to share his culture and has led him to a deeper understanding of who he is as a Native Hawaiian.

Nick Bradley came across a book about constellations while in middle school. The book piqued his interest and astronomy became a growing hobby. In Hawai'i, palaka and rice bag fashion started as fabrics used to make clothing for laborers. The check-pattern of palaka became a trademark shirt for plantation workers and paniolo in the early 20th century. Clothes sewn from rice bags were born from necessity and resourcefulness when traditional fabric was scarce. Today, they represent two iconic threads of local style and history.

Hawaiian people," explains Choy. "A good poke goes a long way, in many ways, in friendship, in love, in sharing. A good poke does that."

**'ONO! The Joy of Lau Lau** makes stomachs rumble with an in depth look at the origins of Hawai'i's signature dish. Whether a family celebration, a restaurant meal or a fundraiser, its origins and how the tradition of preparation brings generations together for a meal full of memories and smiles.

Malasadas hold a sweet spot for locals and visitors alike. **'ONO! How the Portugese Malasada Took Over Hawai'i** dives into the origins of the sugary treat in Hawai'i.

"Malasadas are a staple food," says Lenny Rego of Leonard's Bakery in Kapahulu, Honolulu. "We grew up with them. They're appropriate for all sorts of occasions and there's something nostalgic about enjoying the same treats that your ancestors did."

Something as simple as shave ice elicits joy and memories with just a mention. "My dad would tell me he would serve kids shave ice, and then, over the years, they grow up, they have their own kids, and they bring their kids to get shaved ice," reminisces Walter Lee of Waiola Shave Ice in Honolulu.

On February 27, PBS Hawai'i is serving up a brand new episode of **'ONO!** all about huli huli chicken. From finding the right chicken and seasoning to cooking it and serving it up, we talk with local chicken masters about tricks of the trade and why a lot of people may have a lot of different ideas about which huli huli chicken is best.

OTHER WAYS TO SUPPORT PBS HAWAI'I

Many supporters are surprised to learn that some of the most meaningful ways to give to PBS Hawai'i do not involve writing a check or using a credit card. Non-cash gifts can be tax-advantaged, easy to arrange and an effective way to sustain the programs you value most.

Here are some of the ways you can make a vital contribution to PBS Hawai'i:



IRA Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs)

If you are 70 ½ years old or older, you can give up to \$100,000 from your IRA directly to PBS Hawai'i without having to pay income taxes on the money. Since a gift from your IRA generates neither taxable income nor a tax deduction, it counts toward your annual required minimum distribution and can benefit you even if you do not itemize your deductions.

How it works

Contact your IRA administrator and request a direct transfer to PBS Hawai'i. To ensure proper credit and acknowledgment, ask that your name and mailing address be included with the distribution, if possible.

Gifts of Appreciated Stock or Securities

Transferring appreciated stocks or bonds to PBS Hawai'i is a great way to make a charitable gift and can benefit you in two ways. When you donate publicly traded investments that have been held for more than a year, you may avoid capital gains taxes. Plus, you can take the full fair market value of the gift on the date it is transferred as a charitable deduction.

How it works

Your broker transfers the securities directly to PBS Hawai'i. Once received, the assets are sold, and the proceeds are used to support our mission immediately.

Donor-Advised Fund (DAF) Grants

If you have a Donor-Advised Fund, you can recommend a grant to PBS Hawai'i at any time. Recommending a grant to PBS Hawai'i is typically quick and can be done online through your DAF provider. Many donors choose to use DAFs for annual support, while others recommend grants to mark special occasions or support specific initiatives.

How it works

Log in to your DAF provider's platform and recommend a grant to PBS Hawai'i (Hawaii Public Television Foundation EIN: 99-0334518).



## SPONSOR PROFILE



Why would a local restaurant chain choose to sponsor PBS Hawai'i's GET CAUGHT READING literacy initiative? The answer is simple: Ruby Tuesday Hawaii CEO Rick Nakashima's roots are in education. "I was an education major at UH Mānoa," says Nakashima, "My mom was a teacher and most of her family members were education majors and teachers. I never taught, but I coached track a lot and I just feel so strongly that a big strength in society is having a good education system with good teachers."

Nakashima's mother, Akiko Edith Nakashima, spent her formative years in the Jerome Relocation Center, a World War II Japanese American internment camp in Arkansas. She went on to attend college at Ohio State University and the University of Hawai'i, eventually earning a master's degree in education at Cal State

Long Beach. Nakashima's father, a U.S. Air Force fighter pilot, died shortly after Nakashima was born, so Akiko raised him as a single mother while teaching in the Seal Beach school system in California. "I was on campus all the time," recalls Nakashima, "I still have early memories of watching her go into the classrooms, or being in the classrooms." The family moved to Hawai'i when Nakashima was in the 6th grade, and Akiko continued teaching at various elementary schools on O'ahu.

While Nakashima eventually chose business over education for his career path, the importance of education instilled in him as a child stayed with him and eventually influenced his decisions to support PBS Hawai'i as both a corporate sponsor and a board member. "I just felt so strongly about what a good job PBS Hawai'i does to promote education in the state



that I wanted Ruby Tuesday Hawaii to be part of that and help support it," he says.

Even during the toughest time for the local restaurant industry, Nakashima's commitment to PBS Hawai'i's mission never waned. "When the pandemic hit, I wasn't sure we were going to make it. What was really top of mind for me was not just my family and my workers, but also the charities we support, and PBS Hawai'i is my number one charity. I wanted to try to get through this [the pandemic] so that we could keep our partnership going." It has kept going and, as with all successful partnerships, the rewards go both ways. "If we give, ultimately, I really know that it comes back one way or another. People realize what you're doing. I get it so often where people thank me and tell me they're supporting us because of what we do for PBS Hawai'i. It's going to weigh out, not only on helping with customer counts or whatever you're keeping tabs on, but just the big picture of being part of something good that benefits society."
