
From doodling as a child to earning two bachelor's degrees, the path to success wasn't always clear for artist and designer Jana Lam. "I put together a portfolio, and I didn't know what to do with that portfolio, but I would carry it around with me wherever I went," says Lam.

Bridging traditional technique with modern artistry is one way to describe the artwork of Kaua'i's Desmond Thain. He's known for his masterful work creating *gyotaku*, or fish prints. The ancient Japanese art form started in the 1800s as a way for fishermen to record the size and species of their catch.

A chance encounter with a local shop owner gave Lam an opportunity. Her father built her a printing table and her mother taught her how to sew. She made a simple tote bag in her parents' garage that became her first sale. Since then, she's made a global splash with her handmade approach, using her vibrant and playful textile prints.

"For the most part, people come to me to print their fish because it's their personal best," says Thain.

With no formal training, he's able to capture the intricate details and textures of each specimen, transforming them into striking and lifelike pieces of art. And while some pieces can take Thain dozens of hours to complete, his full-time job is serving the community as a member of the Kaua'i Police Department.

Affordability has become a national buzzword – overused, underexplained and often stripped of context. But for Hawai'i residents, the concept is anything but abstract. We've lived with one of the highest costs of living in the country for decades, all while navigating a low-wage, service-driven economy.

Food costs continue to climb. A gallon of milk can run \$8 or more, and a plate lunch often falls between \$13 and \$25. More and more of our neighbors are food insecure, unsure where their next meal will come from. And to retire here, one study estimates you would need \$1.7 million saved.

As another quote reminds us, "Sometimes, to do better, you have to go beyond the familiar, looking for solutions out on the edge..."

Housing is the most visible pressure point: the median home price now tops \$1 million. But the truth is, almost nothing in Hawai'i feels affordable anymore. To live comfortably, a single adult needs to earn about \$124,000 a year; a family of four needs nearly \$294,000, according to a study released last summer.

Add in health care, child care, insurance, transportation, electricity, water and sewer fees and, to borrow a line from a film, "in short, you have a ghastly mess."

We are inviting panelists from across the islands to be part of the next **KĀKOU: Hawai'i's Town Hall** to discuss our situation, but more importantly, to identify ways to move forward. Join the live conversation on **Creating a Hawai'i We Can Afford**, Thursday, March 19 at 7:30 pm.

What now? We look for solutions, even if that means thinking outside the box and beyond what's comfortable.


