



AIRS MOST WEDNESDAYS AT 7:30 PM

April 1 | Poets, Waipahu Cultural Park, The Love Notes Learn the history of plantation life in a tour of Waipahu Cultural Garden Park in this edition of *Spectrum Hawai'i* from 1987. Also, hear three Honolulu poets read their works and enjoy doo wop music by The Love Notes, whose members include Pete Hernandez, the father of Bruno Mars.

LOCAL PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS



Big Island native Kolby Akamu Moser sees kūpuna as a “vital backbone” for the perpetuation of Hawaiian culture. Early promotion of the film *Hometown Legends*, which she co-directed with Nainoa Langer of Moloka’i, included the phrase; “Ka na’auao o nā kūpuna ka lama, e ho’omālamalama i ke ala no nā keiki,” which translates to “the wisdom of the elders is the torch that enlightens the path of the children.”

With that in mind, she sat down with five Native Hawaiian kūpuna to document their mea hana (craft) and kuleana (responsibility) as was passed down to them to preserve their ‘ike (knowledge) for the next generation.

Moser describes these kūpuna as living legends who represent paniolo (cowboys), lawai’a (fishermen), po’e ulana (lauhala weavers), pahu (drum) carvers and hoe wa’a (canoe paddling).

“These kūpuna have dedicated their lives to protecting culture, land and ways of living that are deeply rooted in Hawaiian values, yet many of their stories haven’t been widely documented,” Moser says. She describes them as humble people who would not seek out recognition and added, “Their lives are reminder that culture survives through action.”

Moser says making the film reinforced how important it is to listen. “When you sit with kūpuna and really take the time to hear their stories, you realize how much guidance there is for how we navigate the future.”
